## 2014 Red Burgundies

*“As someone who spent most of June, July and August of 2014 in Burgundy watching it rain, I confess that I did not begin my October and November 2015 tasting campaign with a great deal of enthusiasm. The thought of visiting roughly 120 growers in a 7-week period hoping to find a few good wines while tasting through a sea of mediocrity was daunting to say the least.*

*So what happened? I am extremely happy to report that by the end of my trip I had completely changed my opinion and I am avidly enthusiastic about the 2014 vintage. While it is true that the 2014 vintage is user-friendly in that in many cases the wines will be accessible young, I believe that it is also true that they are going to age extremely well. There is a beguiling freshness coupled with first-rate drinkability that makes the 2014s extremely pleasurable. Often vintages that are approachable young are that way because they have lowish acidities, below average concentration or very high levels of ripeness, yet 2014 is none of those things.*

*So, as with every vintage, the two questions that take precedence over everything else always are: Should I buy the wines and if so, how much? The best wines are wonderfully refreshing, highly drinkable and transparent medium-bodied wines that possess solid but not aggressive tannic spines supplemented by sufficient but not high acidities. They are balanced wines built for medium-term aging yet should be reasonably approachable young if youthful fruit is your preference.*

*I note the generally softer approach to extraction that many growers elected to use and thus most 2014s have relatively fine-grained tannins which will also help them to be accessible young. This is partially because the tannins are generally ripe and partially because there is a reasonably good level of tannin-buffering dry extract that renders them less prominent at this early stage.*

*As to longevity, the average 2014 is built for mid-term cellaring though as I also noted, many wines will also drink well on the younger side. By contrast some wines are quite firmly structured and will require a minimum of 10 to 15 years of cellaring before they will be reach their apogees. And like almost every recent vintage, there is a small segment of wines that possess the scaffolding to improve over a very long period of time, which is to say out to 15 to 20 years or in a few cases, even longer.*

*Two of the aspects that I like best about the 2014s is their transparency to the underlying terroir coupled with their sheer drinkability. This transparency is enhanced by terrific vibrancy because the wines really do taste alive in the mouth as they’ve got energy, or what I like to call underlying tension. They’re ripe yet they are what the French call digest, or refreshing, where the first sip invites the next which is in fact what makes them so drinkable.*

*The best 2014s are going to provide a great deal of pleasure and in this strict sense they remind me of such vintages as 1985, 1992 and 2000. Now in saying this I do not mean to imply that the 2014s necessarily closely resemble any of these vintages except in the context of their excellent drinkability at any early age that continues even today.*

*I would suggest that when the 2014s hit the market that you buy a few and see for yourself what you think. But if you liked the 1985s, 1992s or, 2000s I believe that you will like the 2014s.”*
